## Message from the Executive Director



Twenty-twenty-three was an exciting and transitional year for the festival. We adopted a new name, cast a wider-than-ever marketing net, tried new things programmatically, kicked off new collaborations and took meaningful steps toward a future as a professionally staffed organization. In spite of a tropical storm that kept much of our expected audience home on festival weekend this season, we're excited about where we are seven years into this venture now called **GreenStage**.

Artistically, the 2023 festival was a terrific success. We built back to 24 free live events from our Covid-induced low of six in 2021, presenting strong diversity in artistic genre, race, culture, gender and gender identity, age and ability; eight events involved experiential and/or educational elements a central part of our mission. We expanded the festival to a week, introduced visual art and stand-up comedy, and premiered three new works. There was a booth where people could share and record their stories. An all-abilities dance workshop series was fully enrolled, a lot of fun and deeply moving. We again offered performing arts classes to Guilford public school students; scheduling challenges pushed some of them into 2024.

The beginning of a new year brought new encouragement and validation. We were awarded a \$50,000 grant from the Town of Guilford's American Recovery Plan Act funds. We hired our first office administrator. We elected a new vice chair and two new board members, and signed up several new volunteers. Our new advisory board has its first six members, and we've begun a strategic plan that will give us crucial community input and pay dividends in the festival's future shape, scale and sustainability.

We're thrilled about the possibilities as we leverage this new energy, new talent and new resources. Planning for the next festival and other events is underway as we establish a more visible, ongoing presence in the Shoreline arts and cultural landscape. We're able to do this only because of the tremendous support of this great, arts-loving community—and for that we continue to be immensely grateful.

The 2023 festival presented 14 live performances, eight performance-workshops and two other events. We premiered three new works in music, drama and storytelling. There was folk, brass band, jazz and classical music; opera, cabaret and solo piano; ballet and contemporary dance. There were five women storytellers, two comedians, two staged play readings and a puppet show. Plus music and dance from Puerto Rico, Central Asia, India, the Middle East and Ukraine.

## Experience

We invested most of our effort this year in public performance-workshops, offering eight educational or jump-in, learn and try-it-yourself dance, music and cultural events. Plus a storytelling booth and a multi-day dance workshop culminating in a performance for people of all physical, cognitive and emotional abilities. We offered programs in jazz, musical scoring, choral singing, spoken word and movement to the Guilford public schools and are working with Guilford Public Schools to most effectively provide in-school programming in the future.
